A regular meeting of the Highland Park Mayor and Council was held in Borough Hall, 221 South 5th Avenue, on Tuesday, October 21, 2014 and was called to order by Mayor Gayle Brill Mittler at 7:06p.m. Mayor Brill Mittler read the Open Public Meetings Statement.

Main Street Minute - No one appeared to present Main Street Minute.

Council Reports:

<u>Councilman George</u> reported that he held an Economic Development and Planning Committee meeting last week. He will be meeting with Main Street Highland Park on Monday to discuss their donations program (benches, planters, living room areas). He met yesterday with the Borough Administrator and representatives from Main Street about the donation program. They need to iron out financial controls as it relates to the donation program.

<u>Councilman Erickson</u> – No report.

<u>Councilman Millet</u> reported that street trees will be planted by the end of the month for residents who requested them. There is a form available on the borough website for interested residents. The Shade Tree Advisory Committee reviews all applications and provides recommendations for tree to plant in that space and surrounding area conditions.

Councilwoman Foster-Dublin reported that October is Fire Prevention Month. This is the month where we set clocks back and should remember to change batteries in smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The Fire Department held their open house recently and went to the schools and did public safety and fire prevention awareness. The Public Safety Building Dedication will be on November 2nd at 2PM. Halloween is coming soon and adults should supervise their children. She asked that Chief Rizco address the placement of cameras in the Council Chambers.

<u>Chief Rizco</u> reported that for security purposes closed circuit cameras were installed in the Council Chambers to monitor court sessions and council meetings. They are awaiting the installation of the monitors at headquarters.

<u>Councilwoman Foster-Dublin</u> added to her report by noting that October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Women should monitor themselves to stay healthy.

<u>Councilman Potts</u> congratulated the new officers of the Teen Advisory Committee. Youth basketball registrations are due by October 24th. They need adult coaches, and anyinterested individuals should contact Recreation Program Coordinator, Andrea Baay. This Sunday, October 26th, is the final day of the Park It Event. The Halloween Festival will take place at the high school from 2-5PM. They will award prizes for best costume.

Councilwoman Welkovits thanked the Millet family for donating a piano to the Housing Authority for their community room. The Human Relations Commission met last week and has begun planning the Martin Luther King Event which will be held on January 19, 2015. The Human Relations Commission will be celebrating their 65th year in existence. She outlined the schedule of events for the Park It Program that will begin on Thursday, October 23rd at 7:30 PM at Kinetics Fitness. The program continues on Saturday and Sunday will various events scheduled throughout both days. Information is available at Borough Hall and will be posted on the Borough's website and in the e-newsletter. On the agenda the Council will be approving a resolution in support of Sustainable Highland Park seeking a grant for a resiliency study. November is Pancreatic Awareness month and the Council will be adopting a resolution in support of that cause. Flu shots are available to Highland Park residents at the Edison County Board of Health. The schedule will be posted on the website. The annual Veteran's Day parade will be held and the students from the Irving School and Bartle School will be in attendance.

Borough Administrator Kovach reported that with the closed circuit cameras the Policedepartment can only watch the proceedings, they cannot hear what is being said.

Borough Attorney Schmierer – No report.

Mayor Brill Mittler reported that if you drive down Raritan Avenue at night you will see new, brighter lights illuminating the sidewalks and the street. PSE&G has begun the replacement program and there is no cost to the Borough. Also as you drive on Raritan Avenue you will see that the wall near the former Y property has been cleaned and painted. She is hopeful that the artwork will be added to the wall soon. They are awaiting approval of the design by the NJDOT. Additionally, as you drive on Raritan Avenue, you will notice that sharrows have been painted (wheels with bicycle and 2 chevrons). The Borough will be putting an educational packet together to provide to residents. This allows for motorists and bicyclists to share the road. This week's Wednesday morning walk with the Mayor will be postponed due to forecasted rain. She encouraged everyone to stay active and she will see them next week. The Park It Celebration begins on October 23rd with event at Kinetics at 7:30PM. It continues on Saturday, October 25th beginning with a Tailgate Party at Pino's at 10AM and concludes with a Meet the Mayor Coffee Social at OQ Coffee at 7PM. It begins again on Sunday, October 26th at 10AM with an Art Exhibit at Beamsderfer Gallery and concludes with the Halloween Party at the High School.

WHEREAS, pancreatic cancer is the only major cancer with a five-year relative survival rate in the single digits at just six percent;

WHEREAS when symptoms of pancreatic cancer present themselves, it is generally late stage, and 73 percent of pancreatic cancer patients die within the first year of their diagnosis while 94 percent of pancreatic cancer patients die within the first five years;

WHEREAS approximately 1,220 deaths will occur in New Jersey in 2014;

WHEREAS, the Recalcitrant Cancer Research Act was signed into law in 2013, which calls on the National Cancer Institute to develop a scientific framework, or strategic plans, for pancreatic cancer and other deadly cancers, which will help provide the strategic direction and guidance needed to make true progress against these diseases;

WHEREAS, the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network is the national organization serving the pancreatic cancer community in Highland Park, NJ and nationwide through a comprehensive approach that includes public policy, research funding, patient services, and public awareness and education related to developing effective treatments and a cure for pancreatic cancer;

WHEREAS the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network and its affiliates in Highland Park, NJ support those patients currently battling pancreatic cancer, as well as to those who have lost their lives to the disease, and are committed to nothing less than a cure;

WHEREAS the good health and well-being of the residents of Highland Park, New Jersey are enhanced as a direct result of increased awareness about pancreatic cancer and research into early detection, causes, and effective treatments;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Highland Park that the month of November 2014 be declared as "Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Month" in the Borough of Highland Park, Middlesex County, New Jersey.
