#### **Council Update from Councilman Matthew Hersh**

Our Human Relations Commission has kicked into high gear, having launched a book club that explores pressing issues facing our community and so many communities across the country. I'm energized by this program because creating a fishbowl where neighbors can have an intellectually honest discussion about cultural barriers, institutional obstacles and unconscious bias by way of a critical analysis of a shared text can have particularly profound results.

We embrace our cultural diversity very well in Highland Park and that is immensely important. That said, we have to "walk the walk" as well and I will work closely with our Human Relations Commission Chair Ashton Burrell and the entire HRC to chip away at those abstract perceptions that limit our practical understanding of race and bias. We all have prejudice and undoing that is a lifelong endeavor. That journey starts right here at home.

Our Commission on Immigrant and Refugee Affairs, created to carry out the goals advanced in the Borough's Inclusive Communities resolution, is working overtime to implement local policies as well as working with allies in the immigrant rights movement and advocating for statewide legislation and policies. This work is so critical, now more than ever. Just last week, the Borough Council unanimously passed a resolution that supports the New Jersey Safe and Responsible Drivers Act, whose purpose is to enhance road safety by ensuring that all drivers, regardless of immigration status, are properly tested and licensed, and are driving vehicles that are registered and insured. This bill enjoys a large cadre of sponsors and co-sponsors that comprises our own Assemblywoman Nancy Pinkin.

We are also working on moving administration of the Borough's municipal ID to the Highland Park Public Library, whose director, Jane Stanley, has been a great partner in this effort. Get your HP ID by filling out the application at www.hpboro.com.

Former NJ Health Commissioner Dr. Cliff Lacy and I met last month with Jennifer Shukaitis, Assistant Professor/Educator in the Department of Family and Community Health Sciences at Rutgers Cooperative Extension. We talked about partnering on health and wellness initiatives and other programs that fit into the goals of the Mayor's Wellness Campaign. We had a productive discussion and also identified grant opportunities. Stay tuned as this relationship develops and we look forward to partnering with our Board of Health on many new initiatives.

The Highland Park Commission for Universal Access continues its work on next steps for an inclusive playground and continually reviews development applications to provide input. It is also campaigning for clear curb cuts and downtown sidewalks when it snows. As a walking community, this work is critically important.

There is so much work being done that might not rise to level of townwide awareness, but I'd be remiss to not mention that the lion's share of our community work includes the Highland Park Community Food Pantry as it continues to provide excellent service to its clients, and our Highland Park Housing Authority whose executive director, commissioners, resident advisors, and I are working to address capital needs solutions in a time of severe HUD austerity.

Finally, thank you to everyone who attended our annual Unity Day celebration on March 18 at the Senior/Youth center. We enjoyed performances by Highland Park's own bluegrass and folk singer Sheila Shukla, Be. You. Dance Center, Amandala, the GLOW program, and the Highland Park High School Choir.
