2021 was certainly a challenging year. And, while we don't know what lies ahead for us in 2022, I do know that Highland Park has proven that we can stand up to and face any obstacles that get thrown our way.

One year ago, we debated what to do about our eclectic, but vital Woodbridge Avenue commercial corridor. This year, our Woodbridge Avenue corridor was named a participant in NJ State's NPP (Neighborhood Preservation Program) program and received a grant of over \$500,000 over 5 years for improvements to its streetscape and modernization.

One year ago, we pondered whether our eclectic downtown would ever achieve the economic vision and stimulus it needs to modernize and move into the 21st Century. This year a well, thought-out plan for downtown revitalization and redevelopment was finalized and is now awaiting developer opportunities.

One year ago, despite the slowdowns in construction countrywide, Highland Park's newest residential project, The Fredrick condominiums, was an approved project. Today it is nearly completed and almost sold out. This is a testament to the desirability of living in Highland Park.

One year ago, we increased funds in our police training budget and

Chief Abrams' instituted new policies and procedures for our officers. Today, we have seen a 60% decrease in use of force reports, a trend over the last 3 years.

One year ago we approved and vowed to contribute to a grant submission that would provide much needed grant funds to update and repair our Library building, including the roof. Today, I am happy to report that we will receive grant funds of \$472,464 from the NJ State Library Bond Act towards library building improvements and repairs.

We will continue to strive to make it economically feasible for folks of all financial means to live comfortably in our community by emphasizing smart

We will continue to move our infrastructure into the 21st Century with help from State and County grants that allow for road repairs and other structural updates and improvements.



Parking Ordinance: An ordinance to amend Chapter 7 of the Highland Park Code which governs parking regulations was introduced at the January 18th meeting of the Mayor and Council. The introduced ordinance clarifies where parking is and isn't permitted during snow removal on Lincoln Avenue and Wayside Drive and also removes the no parking restriction on the east side of Lincoln Avenue between Raritan and Walter Avenues. A public hearing on this ordinance was held on Tuesday, February 1st at 7:00 p.m. at the next regular meeting of the Mayor & Borough Council.

by appointment. Pick-ups will be scheduled on Wednesdays during the months of April, May, June, September and October. To make an appointment, please call Public Works at (732) 247-9379.

Each household may request up to two collections per year. There will be an additional bulk pick-up on September 13, 2022.

Materials may be placed at the curbside no sooner than one hour before sundown of the day prior to scheduled pick-up. Materials not properly secured/bundled and unacceptable items (see list below) will not be collected. Materials put out for collection, without a scheduled appointment or on the wrong date, will not be collected.

The Highland Park Fire Department (HPFD) took many strides in 2021 to improve their services and are continuing the momentum into 2022.

In 2021, the volunteer firefighters continued to train and drill to improve

their skills by taking classes at Middlesex County Fire Academy. During Hurricane Ida, HPFD members responded to 40+ calls, rescued several stranded civilians and mitigated issues within town. Throughout 2021, the HPFD had over 500 calls including 30 fires, and 80+ hazardous conditions.
