Memo from Councilman Josh Fine



In 2017, as Chair of the Finance Committee, I have had the great opportunity to work with volunteers who are dedicated to enhancing the quality of life in our wonderful Borough.

In January, the Finance Standing Committee introduced, and the Borough Council adopted, a resolution to establish a Shared Services Commission. Former Highland Park Mayor Stephen Nolan was appointed to serve as Chairperson of the Commission. The Commission Members are Highland Park Board of Ed President Darcie Cimarusti, the Highland Park Public School District's Business Administrator Linda Hoefele, Police Chief Stephen Rizco, Department of Public Works Superintendent Don Rish, Library Executive Director Jane Stanley, Housing Authority Executive Director Donna Brightman, Assistant Borough CFO Gabriel Paul, and Highland Park residents Phyllis Goldstein, and Dr. Marc Scheiner. The purpose of the Shared Services Commission is to make recommendations to the Mayor and Borough Council regarding potential revenue and savings opportunities for Highland Park to pursue.

In February, the Community Development Block Grant ("CDBG") Committee met, and voted to recommend to the Mayor and Council how to allocate the \$58,567 in federal funds that Highland Park will receive in 2017 through the CDBG. The CDBG Committee voted to fund HP Gives a Hoot (\$4,000), Façade Improvement on Raritan Avenue (\$5,000), the Teen Center (\$7,000), Summer Camp Program (\$9,765), Teen Youth Programming and Outreach (\$7,765), Senior Outreach (\$9,765), Senior Medical Transportation (\$6,636), Senior Outreach Senior (In-Town) Transportation (\$6,636), and the Food Pantry (\$2,000). The Council adopted the CDBG Committee's recommendations

The Library Board of Trustees and its Chair, Bruce Tucker, continue to work to ensure that the Highland Park Free Public Library is one of the Borough's greatest resources. In March, the Library announced the addition of Hoopla Digital to the services it offers. Hoopla Digital is a digital media service through which provides library card holders with the ability to enjoy nearly half a million titles in the following formats: Movies, TV, Music Albums, eAudiobooks, eBooks, and Comics/Graphic Novels. With Hoopla Digital there are no hold lists, and library card holders may borrow up to four (4) titles per month. Also, the Annual Friends of Library Book Sale, which was recently held, successfully raised \$8,499.

The Digital Data Task Force, led by its Chair, Seton Hall Professor Dr. Matthew Hale, has been working on determining which smart city technologies should be introduced in Highland Park to enhance our residents experience with municipal government and in the Highland Park community. Two ideas that the Digital Data Task Force hopes will come to fruition in Highland Park this summer are Highland Park Smart City Hub and Alexa Comes to Highland Park.

In February, the Digital Data Task Force met with the Executive Director of the non-profit New Brunswick Office of Innovation Brendan Kaplan, who developed an open source alternative, a kiosk that will provide information about both municipal and community events within Highland Park, which the Task Force refers to as the HP Smart City Hub. The kiosks were originally developed for New Brunswick, and the New Brunswick Office of Innovation has expressed interest in giving the code away for free to Highland Park.

In May, the Digital Data Task Force decided that Alexa Comes to Highland Park should become a reality in Highland Park. Oceanport Boy Scout Troop 58, interested in coding, and looking to earn a merit badge, trained Amazon Alexa to give people directions around Highland Park's Borough Hall and to answer frequently asked questions about the offices at Borough Hall. Alexa Comes to Highland Park is scheduled to be installed in Borough Hall in June.

I remain committed to enhancing the quality of life of Highland Park residents, and exploring ways to stabilize property taxes, encouraging mixed use development in Downtown Highland Park, and focusing on preservation to protect our environment.

Heartsaver Award for the Borough

The Borough of Highland Park has been awarded a New Jersey American Heartsavers and Stroke Heroes Award from the American Heart Association (AHA) and American Stroke Association (ASA).

The Borough received this award for our efforts to strengthen the Chain of Survival, a project led by the Mayor's Wellness Campaign (MWC) and its Chair, Dr. Clifton Lacy. Our goal to become the first HeartSafe Community in New Jersey, which was achieved in February 2017, included adding heart defibrillators in all public municipal buildings, as well as CPR and defibrillator training for employees and residents. As a result of these additions and programs, we were also recognized by the AHA and ASA.

The Borough will be presented with an award at a dinner ceremony on June 13. Thank you to Dr. Lacy and the MWC for all your efforts to help make Highland Park a healthier and safer place to live.

Remembering a Notable Highland Park Resident

Lifelong Highland Park resident Albert Silvio Garlatti passed away on May 9 after a long battle with Parkinson's disease and cancer. Garlatti co-owned the Highland Park based Albert Garlatti Construction Co. with his brother for more than 50 years. He was also an active member of St. Paul the Apostle church in Highland Park, serving as an usher and on the Finance Committee. He was also a member of the Serra Club and Knights of Columbus Council No. 6306. Garlatti was chairman of the Highland Park Housing Authority, where he served for 40 years. He will be remembered for his generosity and strength of character, as well as his tremendous love for his family.

Highland Park Resident Receives Patient Courage Award



Highland Park resident Franco Juricic will be receiving a Patient Courage Award from the Mayor's Committee on Life Sciences, a partnership of the NJ League of Municipalities and We Work for Health NJ.

Juricic is receiving this award for his incredible journey from pancreatic cancer patient to NYC Marathon runner. In 2008, it was a life goal of his to run the marathon; however, one day before the race he noticed something wrong. Diagnosed with pancreatic cancer, he had to postpone his goal to get treatment, including a complicated abdominal surgery with only a six percent survival rate past five years.

In 2013, to commemorate his five-year survival mark, Juricic was finally able to complete the New York City Marathon. But he also knows the heartbreak of this disease, as his father passed away from pancreatic cancer in 2012. In his bid to help others suffering from this disease, Juricic is now the Advocacy Coordinator for the New Jersey affiliate of the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network.

Juricic will be presented with this award at the Highland Park Council meeting on June 13.
