REGULAR MEETING – SEPTEMBER 6, 2022

A Regular Meeting of the Highland Park Mayor and Council was held via Zoom, on Tuesday, September 6, 2022, and was called to order by Mayor Brill Mittler at 7:00 PM. Annual Notice of this meeting was provided to The Home News Tribune, the Star Ledger and the Highland Park Planet on January 5, 2022. In addition, notice of this meeting via zoom was faxed to The Home News Tribune and emailed to The Star Ledger and the Highland Park Planet on September 1, 2022 and was posted on the Borough website at <u>www.hpboro.com</u> and on the bulletin board at Borough Hall, 221 South Fifth Avenue, Highland Park, NJ on September 1, 2022, and has remained continuously posted as required by law.

Present: Mayor Brill Mittler; Councilpersons Foster, George, Hale, Hersh arrived at 7:59 p.m.; Borough Attorney Schmierer; Attorney Baumann; Borough Administrator Jover, Borough Clerk Santiago.

Absent: Councilpersons Canavera, Kim-Chohan.

Ron Breining, one of the Field Inspectors and the Project Supervisor, for the revaluation process appeared to give a presentation. Today was officially their start date for the revaluation, however due to inclement weather they were unable to go and perform any of the exterior inspections. People may have seen him driving around doing vacant lots or checking out properties. We typically do that during rainy days or snowy days in the latter parts of the year so we can try to be efficient in our data collection. There may be weather again tomorrow but they hope to get out at least a little bit tomorrow. On Thursday, they will start inspections for properties located on the North side. Once completed, they will do inspections in the Triangle and then move to the South side. There are only a few of them doing inspections right now, but they hope to have more hands on deck as the year progresses. Anyone with concerns or wanting an appointment to be scheduled prior to your initial visit should contact their office or contact the Tax Assessor's Office. They hope to complete initial inspections by mid-October and then they should be able to finish appointments and second attempts in early to mid-November. There is a Highland Park tab there and it has the initial contact letter and it has the brochure that is sent along with the letter that should answer a lot of general questions.

Mayor Brill Mittler asked the Council members to present their reports.

Councilwoman Foster reported that September is National Preparedness Month. We have lots of well needed rain, but need more of it to keep our reservoirs full and our plants happy. People should always have a ready kit available for emergencies with needed medications, flashlights, chargers, etc. and put in a place where they have easy access to it. More information will be posted on the Borough website about how to prepare and suggested items to pack in case of an emergency. Blood banks are in desperate need of blood and asking for people to donate this weekend at the New Jersey Blood Service Center, 167 New Street, New Brunswick. She mentioned the construction that is going on in town in some areas and the inconveniences some residents are experiencing. She asked residents to bear with them as they take steps to address those issues.

Councilman Hale reported that the Arts in the Park event is returning on Sunday, September 11th. This is a huge event for Highland Park and Main Street Highland Park. The event features artists from all over the State and from around the Country to come and show their wares. There's music and food and it's a big street party. The event will run from 11:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on Raritan Avenue. The following week they will have an outdoor movie theater at 9:00 p.m. and they will be showing the movie Raising Arizona. There will be a Night Owl Market on the 17th. This is an arts and crafts market that runs from 4:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. The town wide garage sale will take place on the 17th and 18th. It is an opportunity to get out and walk around to see all the wonderful offerings that residents have out.

Councilman George reported that he drove the roads almost every day during the grinding and paving projects to see how we're doing. He gave a shout out to the Police Department, the Department of Public Works and the workers who really moved this large project along in a relatively short time. There is still a lot of inconvenience on River Road as the road was milled and is awaiting paving by the County. There are some changes in schedule for trash pickup this week because of the Labor Day holiday. Bulk trash pickup has been moved to start after the town wide garage sale. Recycling will be cancelled the week of the 20th

Councilwoman Foster added to her report by noting that the Smart Street Program will launch tomorrow with a ribbon cutting at the Welkovits Pavilion at 3:30 p.m.

Borough Administrator Jover thanked everybody for their patience in getting through the PSE&G road restoration. She knows that they could do better with the no parking signs and they will continue to refine the protocols. If all goes well, this is the last week for milling and paving. After the completion of the PSE&G paving work, there are a bunch of Borough roads that will be paved this year. PSE&G can only restore the amount of square footage that they disturb and that is to protect the ratepayers. We try to get as much of the roadway improved as is reasonable and then we try to fold our road projects around that. Some roads are halfway paved and we will be inspecting those roadways and if it makes sense to come back in a future Borough project to complete the remaining half. You will see a portion of South 4th Avenue not repaved and the concrete areas on Johnson Street and Montgomery Street not done. Those roadways will be addressed as part of the upcoming Borough project. Information on the road projects can be found on the Borough website. The County will be doing some innovative striping for the Borough to make it a little more pedestrian and bicycle friendly by narrowing the roadway with some shoulder markers and allowing for parking spaces along River Road in front of the new building on the corner of River Road and Walter Avenue. The County will be looking at adding additional crossings across River Road on both sides of Walter Avenue and Harrison Avenue. They do paving one year and concrete work the next year. Lastly, there were some issues with improper parking on Walter Avenue and she believes the Police Department

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is looking at the issue and they will put up some temporary signage. Permanent signage will be put up as soon as they have the mark outs and the bike lane will be installed next month. The developer's contractor will be doing that work under the supervision of the Borough.

Chief Abrams noted that a couple of weeks ago they started getting complaints about some of the parking and traffic issues on Walter Avenue. He had his Traffic Safety Unit take a look at it and they came up with a couple of ideas. The problem at the time was things were still under construction so there was nothing permanent. They went out today and put temporary no parking signs so they can enforce no parking on the wrong side of the street and parking against the flow issues. The Department of Public Works has to call for mark outs. Once that gets done, we should have signage up there and the ability to make sure people are parking correctly.

Borough Attorney Schmierer – No Report.

Mayor Brill Mittler reported that it was delightful to see young families and children walking to school with backpacks again all throughout New Jersey. It is a wonderful sight to see as we return to normalcy here in Highland Park and the rest of the State. She has also been enjoying the Facebook photos proud parents have been posting of their sons and daughters in new grades and she wished all the children, their parents, their teachers and school administrators much success this year. As you are all aware, all of us at Borough Hall, your Council Members and I, plus the staff were working all summer to help make improvements in our town. We've recently received official notice that we were awarded three grants for projects in town. First, a \$150,000.00 New Jersey Urban Community Forestry grant for community forestry activities led by our Shade Tree Advisory Committee; a \$7,674.00 grant from the Municipal Alliance for mental health and drug prevention efforts in the public schools overseen by our Community Center staff; and a \$5,000.00 Youth Leadership Grant funded by the Governor's Council on Alcohol and Drug Abuse for prevention efforts in the schools. She thanked the staff and the Governing Body for achieving these grants. She has been working the last month and a half to identify grocery store options for our town in the wake of the decision of Stop and Shop to close sometime in 2023. She has been in discussions with the New Jersey Food Council to fine tune what our options are and who are the most likely candidates. We're also exploring how we can leverage our redevelopment plan and the contact it has given us with developers interested in the Borough to find a supermarket that can thrive in Highland Park. She thanked the Borough Administrator and Councilman Hale for their work on this. Lastly, she is pleased to announce, that barring no surprise Covid outbreak, the Borough will return to in-person Council Meetings on Tuesday, November 1st. These meetings will be fully in person meaning all participation is in real life and there will be no hybrid remote components. The meetings will be broadcast live on our Fios and Optimum Cable access channels as well as the YouTube channel.

Mayor Brill Mittler opened the meeting for public discussion and called upon all those wishing to speak to identify themselves. The total time for this session is 21 minutes; three minutes maximum per speaker. Comments are limited to items on the agenda. If you want to speak on an item that is not listed, there will be an opportunity to do so later in the meeting.

Lois Lebbing, North 2nd Avenue, commented that she wanted a more detailed explanation for item 14a on the consent agenda regarding microgrid services. She also asked for an explanation of item 14i on the consent agenda regarding special environmental counsel for JSM vs. Highland Park.

Marion Sackrowitz, South 5th Avenue, commented about item 14i on the consent agenda that authorizes an additional \$50,000.00 for legal fees in addition to \$200,000.00 that had been previously authorized. She asked for status update on that litigation matter and noted that she is concerned that so much money is being spent before the property is remediated.

Mary Forsberg, 317 Denison Street, commented about the addition of Wachovia Bank and the Parktown building to the redevelopment. She commented that they have picked the one spot in town that is quite successful, the farmer's market, to be redeveloped. She doesn't believe they have done research on the kinds of things Highland Park really needs. She asked about the parking study that was done. She does not believe in Mr. Constantine's vision for the borough and suggested they find other planners.

Peter Spool, 146 Graham Street, commented that he recently visited the farmer's market in Metuchen and saw their redevelopment of a large parking lot with a multi-story building with a parking garage adjoining the building. There was also a very nice large square adjoining the parking deck where they have their farmer's market. He suggested they use Metuchen for comparison rather than a larger town for ideas. As for the redevelopment plan, he hasn't seen anything concrete about what the advantages are for residents,

Abby Stern Cardinale, Harper Street, spoke in favor of the redevelopment as there is clear data on the benefit of redevelopment. She is a big proponent of parks and redevelopment does not take away from that.

Hannah Shostack, 146 North 6th Avenue, commented about the Mayor coming up with ideas to keep Stop and Shop in town. She wondered if doing a redevelopment and having a pilot if they would pass along the savings to keep the supermarket.

Nora Krieger, 19 North 6th Avenue, asked who owns the Stop and Shop property and whether or not they own the entire block.

Marian Sackrowitz, North 5th Avenue, commented that it is her understanding that the Borough lost the lawsuit against Jack Morris about payment for the remediation. Borough Attorney noted that the lawsuit has not yet been decided.

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Mary Forsberg, 317 Denison Street, commented about Peter Spool's earlier comments about Metuchen. That area as a train station and the parking lot and those apartments are connected to that station. She noted that the Stop and Shop property according to the tax records is owned by Nassau Industries.

Peter Spool, 146 Graham Street, commented that Abby's comments were vague because he was looking for more specifics. He thanked the Mayor for being willing to provide those when he brought up Metuchen. He thinks there are advantages with a larger site than with the smaller multiple sites that they've been looking to redevelop.

No one else appearing to be heard, Mayor Brill Mittler closed the public discussion.

WHEREAS, NJSBA has formed the Alliance for a Competitive Energy Services, hereinafter referred to as "ACES," a Cooperative Pricing System (E88-01-ACESCPS) to effectively obtain electricity and other energy-related services for its members; and

WHEREAS, <u>N.J.S.A</u>. 40a:11-10(b) authorizes municipalities to enter into cooperative pricing agreements; and

WHEREAS, ACES, has offered voluntary participation in a cooperative pricing system for the energy-related services to municipalities and counties; and

WHEREAS, the Borough of Highland Park ("Participant") is a current participant in the ACES Cooperative Pricing System;

WHEREAS, NJSBA and the New Jersey Association of School Administrators ("NJASA") has created, and is also offering, the ACESplus Program, which is designed to assist participating government entities with the evaluation and implementation of certain energy related programs;

WHEREAS, as a member of ACES, Highland Park desires to participate in the ACESplus Program for the purpose of designing a TCDER Microgrid as a part of the NJBPU's Microgrid Design Incentive Program; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Highland Park, as follows:

- 1. This resolution shall be known and may be cited as the "ACES Cooperative Pricing and ACESplus Program Resolution for TCDER Microgrid Design Services."
- 2. Pursuant to the provisions of <u>N.J.S.A</u>. 40A:11-10(b), the Mayor and Clerk of the Borough of Highland Park are hereby authorized and directed to use the ACES Cooperative Pricing System Agreement and accept and execute a proposal from Gabel Associates which will be kept on file in the Office of the Borough Clerk.
- 3. Teri Jover, Administrator, or her designee is hereby authorized and directed to work with the Lead Agency, via its professional energy consultant Gabel Associates for the Participant under the ACESplus Program, as authorized by, and in accordance with the requirements of, the Local Public Contracts Law (N.J.S.A. 40A:11-4.6 and 4.1), EDECA and the Proposal at a cost not to exceed \$196,450.00.
- 4. The New Jersey School Boards Association, through ACES and its professional energy consultant, shall be responsible for complying with the "Local Public Contracts Law," <u>N.J.S.A</u>. 40A:11-1.1 *et seq*. and all other applicable laws in connection with the preparation, bidding, negotiation and execution of contracts in connection with the ACES Cooperative Pricing System and the ACESplus Program.

WHEREAS, the Tax Collector has solicited a quote for online tax lien services from ROK Industries, Inc. Agent/Realauction.com; and

WHEREAS, ROK Industries Inc./Realauction.com has the capability to conduct the sale according to the rules and regulations promulgated by the Division of Local Government Services.

WHEREAS, funds are available for this purpose in Current Fund Account No. 2-01-20-145-235 in the amount of \$7,500.00 and Current Account No. 2-05-55-500-233 in the amount of \$7,500.00 for a total amount not to exceed \$15,000.00, as reflected by the certification of funds available by the Chief Financial Officer, no. 2022-27.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Highland Park, New Jersey, that the Administrator is hereby authorized and directed to contract ROK Industries/Realauction.com as the vendor for the online tax sale and the amount not to exceed \$15,000.

Abby Stern Cardinale, Harper Street, commented about the public parks and the fact that a lot of maintenance work needs to be done at the Felton Street Tot lot and Karsey Street Park. She has discussed this with Councilman Hersh and has emailed him about this issue.

Lois Lebbing, North 2nd Avenue, asked why no explanation was given for item 14a on the agenda that she asked for in the earlier public discussion section. She commented that Highland Park has not adhered to the requirements for affordable housing on Cleveland Avenue.

Gabrielle Wilders, 24 Walter Avenue, commented about the parking issues over the weekend on Walter Avenue. She thanked Officer Bibby for coming out and listening to their concerns and Sergeant Soden, who followed up with her twice. She commented about the faded bike lane lines and noted that she believes another one way sign is needed on Walter Avenue. She also would like to see speed limit signs and parking signs.

Mary Forsberg, 317 Denison Street, questioned why the Zoning Board of Adjustment has not met for a number of years and how the zoning on tracts a, b, c and d was done without going to that board. She asked about a concept plan from 2016 that was done for a borough square.

Daniel Stern Cardinale, Harper Street, commented that he is bummed about the Stop and Shop situation but thinks the Borough can use this opportunity to rework that site and meet a number of specific needs. Thinks the Borough could link the lower part of Raritan Avenue with the upper part along with the Woodbridge Avenue corridor.

Lois Lebbing, North 2nd Avenue, asked again about item 14a on the agenda regarding microgrid project and whether this saved the borough any money

Mary Forsberg, 317 Denison Street, commented about the fact that in 2016, the Borough started authorizing bonding for purchasing properties and other various things for a Borough square. She commented about the condition of the gun and boat shop, the Bergen auto property and the houses that they purchased on South 3rd Avenue.

No one else appearing to be heard, the Mayor closed the public discussion.

Work Session:

<u>Drought Restrictions</u> – Councilman George noted that the State and some of the water supply companies starting warning that we were getting into drought restrictions in the State of New Jersey. They have listed Central Jersey as an area of extreme drought right now. As of today, Middlesex Water said that their water supply appears adequate, but they're still recommending volunteer conservation. Our ordinance requires that the Borough Engineer initially make a determination as to whether we're in drought. He believes that the information from NOAA and the DEP and with the maps and the declarations that we are actually in an area of extreme drought. He understands that the announcement may be coming very shortly. He thinks that we should emphasize awareness and encourage residents to eliminate unnecessary water usage. He will be asking Public Safety to move forward with a resolution. We don't declare a water emergency, our ordinance simply says that we implement water conservation measures.
