Memo from Mayor Gayle Brill Mittler



One of my favorite things to do as Mayor is talk to residents about ways we can help Highland Park grow and prosper. My Meet the Mayor events, held on a quarterly basis at a local shop or restaurant, have enabled me to speak with many of you in a relaxed, social atmosphere. Last month's Meet the Mayor event at the Arthur Murray Dance Studio in Highland Park was fun and informative. Nearly 50 residents joined me in a dance class led by Arthur Murray instructors, where we learned how to salsa, and had a great time. Before and after dancing, I was able to speak to some of you individually, and I appreciate your comments and interest in Highland Park. Thank you to everybody who came out to dance, and thanks to Arthur Murray Studio for hosting a very successful Meet the Mayor event. I'm looking forward to another one, at another location in Highland Park, this fall.

As part of our continuing efforts to address the needs of the many different segments of our diverse population, in May our Highland Park Police Department participated in a Sensitivity Training Session for the LGBT community. I joined our Police Officers in this session, along with Councilwoman Foster-Dublin and several Borough employees. It was led by GOAL (Gay Officers Action League) of New York. The presentation and questions were about issues important to the LGBT community, and how to communicate, in a non-threatening manner, with transgender individuals. Coming in the near future, the HP Police Department and the Human Relations Commission will host a Community Forum "Meet and Greet" with the public and members of the LGBT community.

Gun violence is approaching epidemic proportions in the United States. I am proud that a Highland Park resident, Karen Kanter, is taking the lead on this by spearheading Middlesex County's chapter of the Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence/Million Mom March which will be headquartered here in Highland Park. The inaugural meeting was held last week in Borough Hall, and residents from Highland Park and surrounding communities in Middlesex County gathered to discuss ways to stop gun violence, and to volunteer for this campaign.

- On an average day, 89 Americans are killed with guns.
- 7 children under the age of 19 are killed with guns each day in the United
- On an average day month, 51 women are shot by a current or past husband or boyfriend.

Highland Park is now the Center of Middlesex County's efforts to prevent gun violence.

We are lucky to live in a state with some of the toughest gun control laws. However, guns still flow into NJ from surrounding states like Pennsylvania. Join me and the members of the Brady Campaign – Million Mom March to stand together against gun violence and the devastation it causes.

Now that summer is here, I hope to see many of you in our downtown shops and restaurants, (many of which offer outdoor seating throughout the summer), and at our weekly Friday Farmers' Market and our Saturday outdoor movies!



Neil James Alexander Sloane (born October 10, 1939) is a British-US mathematician who has made major contributions in the fields of combinatorics, coding theory, sphere packing, error-correcting codes and more. A current Highland Park resident, Sloane is best known for creating and maintaining the On-Line Encyclopedia of Integer Sequences. Sloane studied at Cornell University, receiving his Ph.D. in 1967. He joined AT&T Bell Labs in 1968, becoming an AT&T Fellow in 1998. Throughout his career, Sloane has received numerous awards for his work, including the Lester R. Ford Award (1978), the Chauvenet Prize (1979), the IEEE Richard W. Hamming Medal (2005), and the Mathematical Association of America David P. Robbins award (2008). Retired since 2012, Sloane enjoys rockclimbing, and has authored two books about rock-climbing in New
