As the *Home News Tribune* newspaper reported on August 10th, the owners of the property that previously had the Stop & Shop Grocery Store are in negotiations with a reputable supermarket tenant. They are discussing a variety of topics and, if a deal is made, the Borough is ready to help. Please keep in mind that an agreement is not a 'done deal.' But we are hopeful.

I've also learned from the new owners of Highland Pizza that they are determined to bring the popular restaurant back to town, in the same location. They are putting in a lot of work to totally revamp the interior of the restaurant to make it more inviting to customers.

And we've seen expanded service options at a few of our other food service businesses, such as Park Deli, Ellinikon Grocery store & cafe (at a new location, on Raritan Ave.), and Pithari restaurant.

Let me close with a request. The Borough is pleased to have a shared services agreement with the Township of Edison, for animal control and their pet shelter. This saves us money and brings us expertise when needed. Recently Mayor Sam Joshi of Edison informed me that the shelter has taken in a record number of pregnant dogs and cats. If you're looking to adopt a new furry companion, please consider adoption from our local shelter.

UPDATES from the BOROUGH COUNCIL



Shared Services for 9-1-1 Dispatching Services:

Borough Council authorized a shared services agreement with Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, to provide emergency communications and radio dispatching services for 9-1-1 emergency calls. This agreement will be effective as of January 2024 and there will be no disruption to emergency

services. A shared services agreement with Rutgers will leverage their network's infrastructure and provide cost savings for the Borough.

Upgrades to the Felton Street Tot Lot:

Borough Council authorized a contract with Ben Shaffer Recreation for upgrades to the Felton Avenue Tot Lot. Improvements include replacement of the playground area with equipment appropriate to 2 to 5 year olds as well as a new poured playground surface to improve accessibility and help with maintenance. Following the installation of the playground, the Borough will finish out the project with new landscaping, including a small patio, benches, picnic tables and shade trees. Due to ongoing supply chain issues, the vendor expects work to commence in Spring 2024.

News from the Woodbridge Ave Neighborhood Preservation Program

Earlier this summer, the Woodbridge Avenue Neighborhood Preservation Program (NPP) Stakeholder Team hosted an informal open house at Molimock-Graff Park to discuss future plans for renovations to the park with neighbors. The Mayor, members of Borough Council, and members of the NPP Stakeholder Team stopped by to hear residents' ideas and concerns about the park. Look for an online survey being launched in mid-September.

On the commercial front, more than ten businesses have applied for facade grants to improve the curb appeal of their businesses. Each business or property along Woodbridge Avenue is eligible for up to \$10,000 in grant funding, the first \$5,000 of which requires no cash match. An additional six businesses are working with independent consultant Storefront Mastery on various improvements that can be made to improve the customer experience. These consultations with Storefront Mastery are being offered at no cost to business owners and are funded through technical assistance grants from NPP.

Summer vocational/service course

The Teen Center/Zone 6 offered a multifaceted workshop series for Borough teens, led by Teen Center Coordinator Ashton Burrell and Pastor Wanda Burrell, from July 5th to July 25th. The classes ran from 9:00 am – 12:00 pm every weekday and the instructors worked with the students on social justice or community service projects and events, as well as life skills and lessons that they can apply in their lives and the upcoming school year. Each day opened with a moment of reflection and thanksgiving.

The students were able to create resumes as well as network with businesses pertaining to their area of career choices. As an example, two students connected with Cyber Knight technology store to get

internships and more knowledge of their career field in technology. The instructors took the students to the Somerset Patriots stadium in Bridgewater where they met with the team owners and administration. They were personally escorted onto the field to share time there with players and coaches. One student captured interviews with players for their online vlog.



The students got to meet and talk with Mayor Elsie Foster and received career advice as well as information on how their town functions. The instructors helped two students create a financial education program, to help their peers, and were also able to get one student registered to vote. They were also pleased to arrange a visit by the local NAACP president, who came in to spend time with the students.
