Highland Park Police Department Use of Force Incidents July 1st – September 30, 2023

Between July 1st and September 30, 2023, Highland Park Police Officers answered a total of 6,343 calls for service. Over the course of that time, officers used force two times.

The individuals:

- 1 Individual was a white male who was a resident of Highland Park
- 1 individual identified as two or more races who is a resident of Highland Park

In regards to the types of force used:

- On one occasion, the individual actively resisted arrest/officer control and assaulted another individual
 - The individual was perceived to be under the influence of alcohol/drugs or both
 - One officer used physical force by using a takedown and a control hold/arm lock on the individual to gain positive control
 - This individual was charged with Simple Assault, Disorderly conduct, and Resisting Arrest.
- On one occasion, the individual exhibited mental health issues and refused to cooperate with a medical professional for mandatory transport to the hospital
 - Two officers used physical force in the form of control holds/arm lock
 - Another officer used physical force in the form of a takedown and pressure point control
- None of the individuals or officers sustained injuries

Origins of initial police contact:

- These incidents did not originate from any of the traffic stops or self-initiated police contact
- These incidents were initiated by the public reporting the situation to the Police and officers were dispatched to the location to investigate

The use of force is never a routine matter and the Highland Park Police Department takes each of these incidents very seriously. The Police Administration reviews each use of force incident in detail.

NJ AOG Use of Force Policy Physical Force: Physical force involves contact with a subject beyond that which is generally used to effect an arrest or other law enforcement objective. Physical force is employed when necessary to overcome a subject's physical resistance to the exertion of the officer's authority, or to protect persons or property. Examples include taking a resisting subject to the ground, using wrist or arm locks, striking the subject with the hands or feet, or other similar methods of hand-to-hand confrontation, such as certain pain compliance techniques.
