Council Reports.

Councilman Postelnik reiterated that we have grocery store transportation and online food shopping assistance available through the Department of Community Services. If you have questions or need more information please reach out to the staff at the Community Center at 732-819-0052. This past Sunday the Community Center had a great turn out for the Halloween Costume and Festival. There was a costume parade, music, bounce house, face painting and tons of families having a great time. Coming up we have the Veterans Day Parade on Saturday, November 11th at 11:00 am at the Dough Boy Monument. We will have a ceremony and then following will be the Parade. The Health Education Series continue this Wednesday, October 25th, it will be there for three more weeks from 1:30 pm to 2:30 pm at the Community Center. The program help promote and sustain older adults on living healthier, more independent lives. On October 25th at the Community Center, we're having the Day of The Dead Celebration for Hispanic Heritage Month and Indigenous Peoples, doors open at 5:00 pm and starts at 5:30 pm. It's going to feature a movie, an educational session, and craft activities for kids and refreshments. Winter Youth Basketball registration just opened, the deadline to register without a late fee is November 21st. You can register on the Borough's Rec website. To cover Councilwoman Kim-Chohan's portfolio of Finance. Tonight we will be voting on the 2022 audit. I'm happy to reiterate that there were no findings or recommendations, which means your audit was clean. There's a Rent Control

Board meeting on Wednesday, October 25th at 5:30 pm at Borough Hall. In Council President Hersh's portfolio is the I Power Ventures Application to build the power plant in Keb, which is in Woodbridge next to the already existing power plant has been withdrawn earlier this month. Highland Park was an early adopter of the resolution to oppose the second power plant in the environments justice section of Woodbridge. It was one of 14 municipalities that eventually opposed the plant and it had the support of our Board or Education, Sustainable Highland Park and our Board of Health. Highland Park is just about five miles away from where that power plant would have been built and would have suffered the increased air pollution, particularly matter that is so dangerous for the lungs of our young residents. We all would have suffered the consequence of the increase carbon emissions adding to the climate crisis for years to come.

Councilman Hale reported the 2023 Night Owl Market dates and times, featuring local artists, artisans and crafters. If you would like to be a vendor please visit mainstreethp.org/vendors. On Friday, October 27th the Farmers Market will have pumpkin painting with a free small pumpkin for kids, or you can purchase larger pumpkins from one of the farmers, there will be live music from the Mike Noordzy Trio at 3:30 pm, and free trick or treat totes filled with treats and local business coupons. On Saturday, October 28 at the Night Owl Craft Market from 4pm-8pm. On Tuesday, October 31 there will be downtown treat or treating from 2:30 pm-5:30 pm in all the residential areas after you hit the downtown businesses, there will be live music from Mike Noordzy and Sleaze Greaze at 3:30 pm, live music from Dennis McDoNoUgh! Aka "Bruce Frankensteen – The original Monster of Rock at 2:30 pm, as well as free trick or treat totes filled with treats and local business coupons, there will also be a Jack-O-Lantern contest, fill out the contest form at mainstreethp.org/jackolantern to enter the contest and learn more, or stop by to look at the entries and vote for your favorite from 2:30 pm - 5:30 pm. As I mentioned at our last meeting now is a difficult and troubling time for many people in our Jewish community. That still remains the case and likely will remain that way for some time. But I wanted to point just a few of the many ways that our community is organizing and responding to this crisis. Two weeks ago, local synagogues set a goal of sending 4 pallets of supplies to Israel; they ended up with 37 pallets. This Thursday night Pinos is hosting a Beer for Israel event at 8:00pm. A five dollar donation to the Jewish Federation Israel Aid Emergency Fund will get you a wrist band that will allow you to drink beer until the keg runs dry. If you are interested in a blue and white tree ribbon to put up until the almost 200 missing and kidnapped people are returned you can get them from the Highland Park Conservative Temple at www.hpct cae.org. These are just a few of the amazing events that have been and will be held in Highland Park. And I want to thank all those involved in planning, organizing and donating to these program

Councilwoman Canavera thanked Councilman Postelnik for giving her report and indicated that due to a hospitalization she haven't been able to attend many meetings and Jason and the rest of the Council have been filling in for me so thank you. She also wanted to let everybody know that her prayers are with everybody who may have family over in Israel and indicated that her boss is there right now and she is praying for you all.

Borough Administrator Jover provided a quick report on the Borough's meter replacement project. As of the 30th of September we've gone past the halfway point in terms of the exchanges, which also means we still have probably close to 1,200 meters to go and we were really hoping to get this project done by the end of the year. Ms. Jover indicated that if you have not scheduled your replacement we now have fairly decent amount of inventory we'll be sending out a reminder letter from the Borough. You can call National metering services 1-888-448-0009. It's very important that we push this project to completion because if it extends too long there'll be some additional cost assigned to the Borough from the contractor so that means we need your help. She thanked the 1,800 who have already participated and noted to those that still need replacing that access to the basement would be necessary. She mentioned

we do have a supply of the Sabbath compliant meters so make sure if you're scheduling your appointment if you haven't already been put on the wait list that you make it clear you're interested in one of those models and before they replace your meter just confirm before they take it off that this is in fact a Sabbath compliant meter because once the old meter comes off you can't put it back on. Please call National metering Services if you have not done so already.

Borough Attorney's Report – no report.

Mayor's Report.

Mayor Foster reported that the Mayor's Teen Advisory Council's goal this year is to meet and speak with influential leaders in town and they were pleased to meet with our Borough Administrator Teri Jover and they spoke with Teri about the redevelopment project and efforts in town and what services Highland Park has in mind. Their next meeting is Monday November 3rd and they're arranging to meet with Kristina Nicosia, Superintendent of Highland Park Public Schools to discuss their thoughts, ideas and plans. She also had the opportunity to attend the senior luncheon at the Community Center. It was spirited as usual they enjoyed their meals and they were happy to engage. Some of the things she spoke about was the concern that most everyone has is Rite-Aid, as everyone is aware Rite-Aid filed for bankruptcy based on the opioid lawsuits that they are facing and I'm happy to report that our Rite-Aid here in Highland Park is staying in place. She gave a quick update on Stop-n-Shop indicting that they were still in Attorney review but they're engaged and that is a good thing. She spoke with Highland Pizza a week ago and he advised that they have changed your mind they're doing extensive inside renovations so they're remodeling the entire inside and once that's completed then they'll do an opening and hoped to see our beloved Highland Pizza back in place again. She indicated that the seniors were concerned with some garbage issues and while I was talking to them about the issues our DPW truck pulled up in front the senior housing building and were addressing the concern so they were quite pleased.

Public Participation.

Mayor Foster opened the meeting for public discussion and called upon all those wishing to speak to identify themselves. The total time for this session is 21 minutes; three minutes maximum per speaker. Comments are limited to items on the agenda. If you want to speak on an item that is not listed, there will be an opportunity to do so later in the meeting.

Mary Forsberg, Denison Ave., said she was interested in having someone who's going to vote tonight speak on Ordinance which increases the density in the CBD. She asked to have the 33% CBD explained and what the future holds with the undisclosed number for the revision.

Councilmember Hale explained under the current existing zoning laws, a central business district buildings cannot have more than 33% of it containing residential housing. It means that all of the buildings on the first level are commercial or retail buildings. You can have an apartment on the second floor of the building but the total percentage of it could not be more than 33% and we're trying to change that. It doesn't change anything about height or restrictions. Mary Forsberg said you're now talking about four or five story buildings. Councilman Hale said not with the Ordinance.

Mary Forsberg asked what kind of density are you talking about? Why can't you put a number in there? Councilman Hale responded that all this says is eliminate the square footage requirement that is in our current ordinance. You can have apartments on the floors above the first, that what this does.

Mary Forsberg said the point of it is to significantly increase the density of residential property in the social business district. Councilman Hale replied I would not say significantly but the idea is that we

would like to increase density in central business district. That is the goal this Council has stated pretty clear and pretty loudly.

Borough Administrator Jover added the property owners of existing buildings want to make renovations adding in the retail establishment. They discovered this provision which would limit their ability to make their projects work. This is coming from small projects with existing property owners and smaller existing buildings that were limited in what their scope and potential were because of that provision.

Mary Forsberg brought up that the redevelopment and Tract C. Borough Administrator Jover said in the redevelopment plan there is no set residential density. There's no limitation that 33% GFA doesn't exist in the redevelopment plan. This is covered by the CBD zoning in the existing properties.

Councilman Hale assured her we're not discussing the redevelopment and Tract C. It's not relevant to the discussion.

Mary Forsberg ask why the Borough has gone forward with the closing of South 3rd. without checking to see how many residents really want the street closed.

Ken Evans, senior at Rutgers ask if the bond ordinance approval with the library result in a tax increase for next year? Borough Administrator Jover we just starting on the 2024 budget, we haven't finished it. There will be future debt that we'll have to pay back that we have to budget for. It's all part of a big amount of money we have to fund. We may have a good year and some surplus or other thing where we don't have to raise taxes for that year's payment; but then circumstances could change. It's a tough question to answer either way.

Dylan Stewart, Rutgers student asked if the Council factored in the traffic in the area that will increase in residential space above the commercial buildings regarding ordinance 23-2080. Councilman Hale said they parking minimums that will still be a part of the central business and those will still apply.

Marion C., Rutgers student asked regarding the Ordinance for the library, how the Council came to a decision on what renovations to do for the library. Borough Administrator Jover answered we have roof issues over there. We need additional money to handle the additional work. There's also other renovations through a grant and through matching funds from the Borough. This is specific necessary improvements to address the water getting in.

Lois Lebbing, North 2nd Avenue said regarding Ord. 23-2079 the one with two family residential lots. You mentioned the lots were too small, they used to be 20/25 wide by 100 and now they're 50 wide by 100/150. Is that what was said? Councilman Hale replied we have non-conforming lots that are odd shaped and sizes. If you have that lot and you want to do something that would require a permit, you have to go to the Zoning Board to get a variance. This makes it easier for people to make improvements on their houses without that extra step of going to the Zoning Board to get a variance.

Lois Lebbing asked what the coverage is for the impervious on residential. Mayor Foster replied that we can review that and get back to her as to what the coverage should be.

Lois Lebbing wants to know what the Borough is doing to prevent the flooding. Borough Administer Jover added relating to the ordinance, the only thing that is being exempted from the Board visit are the lots that are non-conforming in size. You have to meet all the standards of our ordinance. We did an analysis when we did our master plan. This ordinance doesn't exacerbate impervious coverage issues.

Jessica Hunsdon, Montgomery Street, asked for clarification on Ordinance #20-2380. If higher density was wanted in the central business district and it was already included in the Redevelopment Plan then this ordinance does not apply? Mayor Foster answered it is for existing lots, for businesses and residents within the business district.

Jessica Hunsdon asked if this is a prerequisite to amendments to the Redevelopment plan? Borough Administrator Jover replied the ordinance amendment does not impact what's already in the Redevelopment Plan for downtown Tracts A-D.

Jessica Hunsdon asked is this ordinance proposal required to implement the Redevelopment Plan? Councilman Hale responded no.

Jessica Hunsdon asked what is the reason for this ordinance? Borough Administrator Jover answered there are standard in our Central Business districts that prohibit anything more than 33% of a buildings growth floor area to be residential. We have non-confirming buildings and we have people looking to make improvements to buildings to bring them into more conformance. They wanted to put residential on the second and third floors. This ordinance was an impediment to that. This is taking away the restriction on residential uses, limiting to 33%. It doesn't allow them on the ground floor. All the other standards in the central business district Zoning applies.

Jessica Hunsdon mentioned that Mayor Foster said we would be able to see plans for Tract C as soon as December. I wanted to know if that timeline is still expected. Mayor Foster replied that she is working to try to get those plans to keep the timeline, December is the goal.

There being no one further, Mayor Foster closed public participation.
