Memo from Mayor Gayle Brill Mittler



Our National Night Out event at the beginning of August was once again a huge success. It is a testament to our wonderful community that residents enjoy such a close relationship with our police officers. The weather was beautiful, the activities were fun, and the street was packed with dozens of people enjoying the food and festivities. The Police Department continues to serve the many diverse cultures we have in our community with Sensitivity Training sessions, including an upcoming session with members of the Chinese American community. These sessions better train our officers to communicate and appreciate our residents' traditions and cultures.

With school opening soon, please be aware of the increased pedestrian traffic in the morning and afternoon hours, and the many children who walk to school. As part of my emphasis on healthy living, I strongly encourage parents to walk their children to school whenever possible, as opposed to driving. If children walk alone, it is always best to have them walk in groups of at least 2 or 3. Once again the Walking School Bus program will be available, which provides additional safety for children walking to school. Highland Park recently conducted New Jersey's first walkability/bikability study to identify barriers that may make it difficult or dangerous for children to bike to and from school. This study will help ensure the safety of our school children.

As you know, the well-being of our children is critically important to me. Highland Park is not only ethnically diverse, we are also economically diverse. I was so moved and impressed with the success of our "HP Gives a Hoot" fundraisers and program this summer. Between the Parkstock Fireworks Celebration and National Night Out, we raised over \$1000 to help feed our children when school is not in session. Over the summer we were able to give out more than 150 lunch vouchers for children. Thanks to the Global Grace Café, these vouchers were provided at a discounted rate, and the children received a healthy lunch each day. This is a truly sustainable program that provides work opportunities for recent immigrants at the Global Grace Café AND provides nutritional lunches for our youngest residents who might not have had lunch during the summer. We were also able to send 4 high school students to attend the YouthROOTS summer camp program which instills more positive self-awareness and mentorship skills in these teens. On behalf of all the children in Highland Park, thank you to everybody who donated and volunteered, our "HP Gives a Hoot" committee, the Global Grace Café, and the Highland Park Food Pantry.

Please join me at my next Meet the Mayor event at River Ridge apartment building. The event will be on September 21, 7:00pm. I, and other leaders, will talk to residents about the many public safety services available to residents in Highland Park.

Highland Park Launches 9/11 Day of Discussion

On September 11, 2016, the Borough of Highland Park will host the first of a series of important discussions that explore the many policy complexities brought forth by the worst terror attack on American soil.

All too often, If asked about the policy implications of September 11, many individuals would certainly respond with a simple answer: War. But what about the many other themes that day represents? Religion, terrorism, race, wellness and access to emergency mental health, and dwindling resources for first responders must be part of the discussion.

Highland Park is proud to launch "September 11: A Day of Discussion" to examine these complexities. We will start with a conversation, "Destignatizing Mental Health Care," on Sunday, September 11, 2016, 1 p.m. at the Highland Park High School cafeteria.

Featured speakers at this inaugural event include Highland Park resident Beth Angell, an associate professor in the School of Social Work at Rutgers. Angell is also a member of a National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine panel that recently called for a national strategy to reduce stigma toward people with mental and substance use disorders.

Also featured is Highland Park resident Susan Polkowski, a member of the Highland Park Board of Health who has worked directly with 9/11 responders.

Dr. Jeffrey Axelbank, a Highland Park resident and psychologist, will facilitate a community discussion that will provide opportunities to identify specific issues, as well as small groups to address these issues and start to develop some action plans.

He was awarded the Guggenheim and Woodrow Wilson fellowships, and won the 2002 Premio Alfaguara de Novela for his novel Flight of the Queen. In 1995 he took a position as distinguished professor of Spanish literature and director of the Latin American Studies program at Rutgers University, during which time he lived in Highland Park. He wrote columns for La Nacion and the New York Times syndicate.

Surviving Sexual Abuse

Tracy Stopler, a SAFER Volunteer: (Survivors Advocate for Emergency Response), will talk about her new book, The Ropes That Bind--An Inspirational Story of One Survivor's Aftermath of Sexual Abuse, on Saturday, September 17 at 2:00 PM at the Highland Park Public Library, 31 North Fifth Avenue. Tracy connects special victims of rape, sexual assault and/or domestic violence to The Safe Center LI. This program makes it possible for trained volunteers to provide support and advocacy for these special victims in hospitals. Tracy is also a facilitator for The Enough Abuse campaign, a program designed to help adults better understand how to protect children from sexual abuse. A book signing and refreshments will follow the talk.
