UPDATES from the BOROUGH COUNCIL



Cooperation Agreements with HP Gives a Hoot and the HP Community Food Pantry: In order to enhance their programming and qualify for a substantial donation from retired Highland Park Police Officer Leonard Kushner's estate, HP Gives a Hoot and the HP Community Food Pantry were incorporated as nonprofit corporations in 2023. The

cooperation agreements between the Borough and these newly established 501(c)3 organizations formalizes our relationship and provides for space for food distribution and other programming in Borough facilities. Water Meter Replacement Program: Property owners that have not yet had their water meter replaced should contact National Metering Services (NMS) to book their appointment for a meter replacement as soon as possible. NMS has both traditional and 'Sabbath-compliant' water meters available now. NMS can be reached by phone at 1-888-448-0009. This project is a critical component to Highland Park's ongoing efforts to upgrade our aging water infrastructure to ensure the sustainability of the system in the long term. 

Stories of Exile Book Discussion: Welcome to the New World

Monday, March 11, 6:30 p.m. in the Parlor at the Reformed Church of Highland Park (19 S. 2nd Ave., Highland Park).

Join Highland Park Public Library for a discussion of <u>Welcome to the New World</u>, by Jake Halpern and Michael Sloan! This is the final discussion in our Stories of Exile series.

After escaping a Syrian prison, Ibrahim Aldabaan and his family fled the country to seek protection in



America. Among the few refugees to receive visas, they finally landed in JFK airport on November 8, 2016, Election Day. Resettled in Connecticut with

little English, few friends, and even less money, the family of seven strive to create something like home. Welcome to the New World tells the Aldabaans' story.

Adults and teenagers are warmly invited to participate in the discussion! Several copies of the book are available at the library. Place a hold on the book, or borrow

it at HPPL Express (901 Raritan Ave.)! The Yiddish Book Center's "Stories of Exile" Reading Groups for Public Libraries is a reading and discussion program to engage adults in thinking about experiences of displacement, migration, and diaspora. In this program, librarians organize reading groups to discuss three books of Yiddish literature in translation, and one book related to the experience of a community served by their library.

Please note:

- Assistance will be provided by an undergraduate Rutgers School of Social Work intern under the supervision of the SWILIBS-NJ team OR Rutgers School of Social Work and library supervisors.
- The intern will provide "one-stop" information and referral services. The library social work intern is not a licensed social worker. We do not provide clinical social work services (i.e. therapy and counseling) or case management.

- The library social work services are free of charge and are not limited to Highland Park residents.
- If a private room is not available, assistance may be provided in a public space. Assistance will be provided as discreetly as possible, but confidentiality cannot be guaranteed.
- The information shared with the library social work intern will be kept as private as possible; however, information may be discussed with the SWILIBS-NJ team for supervision purposes.
- The internship is part of the Social Work Informed Library Services in NJ program, a partnership between the Rutgers University of Social Work and the New Jersey State Library.


Bulk pick-up by appointment program

The Department of Public Works offers bulk waste collection by appointment. Pick-ups will be scheduled on Wednesdays during the months of April, May, June, September and October. To make an appointment, please call Public Works at 732-247-9379.

Each household may request up to two collections per year.

The week after the townwide garage sale (Tuesday - September 17th & Thursday - September 19th) there will be a bulk pick-up. appointment is necessary. Note: Recycling will not be collected during the week of September 16th -September 20th.

Materials may be placed at the curbside no sooner than one hour before sundown of the day prior to scheduled pick-up. Materials not secured/bundled properly unacceptable items (see list below) will not be collected. Materials put out for collection, without a scheduled appointment or on the wrong date, will not be collected.



Acceptable Items

The following items are examples of acceptable bulk waste and are not collected with the regular garbage

- Furniture sofas, chairs, tables, clothing dressers, bookshelves, mattresses, and box springs.
- Fixtures toilets, tanks, tubs, sink basins
- Carpet rolls under four feet in length, tied securely in bundles not to exceed 18 inches in diameter
- Home Improvement Materials self improvement projects only: Contractor generated material will not be accepted. Material will be accepted with following limits:
 - Four small bundles of wood, under four feet in length, tied securely in bundles not to exceed 18 inches in diameter, nails removed
 - Two doors
 - Five window frames, with alass removed
 - Bundles of sheet rock or paneling, securely bound or weight limit for bundle or container

Unacceptable Items

DPW does not collect/accept at any time the following:

- Dirt
- Concrete
- Roofing materials
- Hazardous materials
- Automotive parts or scraps

Recycling Reusable Items

Instead of recycling expensive Bulk Pick-up, civic-minded donors are providing goods to individuals, organizations and businesses and diverting trash to reuse, thereby cutting municipal expenses and extending the life of local landfills. If you have Reuseable Items to donate, please check the Middlesex County Reuse-It book; a guide to area locations where Middlesex County residents can donate their unwanted goods for reuse.
