**Council Reports.**

Councilman Postelnik reported that the annual summer outdoor concert series concluded this past Thursday with the last concert, he thanked everyone who was involved. Coming up there's a fall lunch on Tuesday, September 10th at 12:00 p.m. at the Community Center there will be lunch, dancing and entertainment provided by SP Candy, lunch will be catered by T Subs with kosher option available upon request. We have an abundance of fall recreation programs open for registration including some adult programs like adult fitness yoga and for the kids we have youth soccer, basketball, chess and flag football. As usual the Youth Theater group course filled up almost as soon as it opened so keep an eye out on the waiting list. He mentioned the Arts Commission is putting on a Poetry Festival plan for October more details to come.

Councilwoman Kim-Chohan reported that the Borough's most recent audit was up on the website to be reviewed by the public it can be found under Department-Finance-financial statements 2023 Municipal Audit. Your June through August water and sewer bill is in your mailbox, reminder this bill reflects the new rate increase cost the Borough must pass on due to Middlesex Water Company increase to purchase water and to support the ongoing repairs and capital upgrades. The Anchor benefit is back again you should have received the benefit letter in the mail by now if you have not or your status has changed please visit [www.nj.gov/treasury/taxation/anchor](http://www.nj.gov/treasury/taxation/anchor). The Finance department is currently looking for a Tax Assessor, if you are someone you know is interested please visit the Borough's website under the employment tab. The next Rent Control meeting is scheduled for September 26 right here in council chambers at 7 p.m. also check the Borough's calendar to make sure there's no cancellations. National Night out as always she was excited to get an up close and personal view of our public safety equipment and good to see some of the neighbors and residents. Hope everyone had a wonderful summer if you are anything like myself you've already ordered or picked up a pumpkin spice item and wishing all the students an awesome and safe school year.

Councilman Hale reported that Arts in the Park is coming this Saturday, September 8<sup>th</sup> it goes from 11:30 to 4:30 and then right so please make sure everybody shows up it's a premier event of the season, a wonderful opportunity to stock up on gifts for the entire year from a variety of different artists from all over New Jersey and beyond. There's environmental uh Outreach there is um On the heels of that will be the town-wide garage sale, there will be garage bands playing while you can pick out some of great things that could use a second home. The garage sale is scheduled for September 14th and 15th all throughout town more information on both of those of course you can go to [mainstreet.org](http://mainstreet.org). The Farmers Market always continues, he gave a shout out to Council President Hersh for refereeing to the hot pepper eating contest shooting some very cool video of people turning

their face off so thank you very much. School is almost back in session so please if you're driving around watch out for the kids, it's important for them to be safe and then lastly just a big congratulations to Officer Cleaver and Sgt. Palumbo both fantastic Officers really wonderful to have them with us in Highland Park.

Councilwoman Canavera reported on a personal level her credit card was stolen and Officer Nickus gave her a lot of good advice after taking a report and thanked Officer Nickus. She welcomed new Officer Cleaver and congratulated Sgt. Palumbo who has always been outstanding. She indicated that the Mental Health Commissions reminds us September is Suicide Prevention Month, a time to raise awareness of this urgently important crisis. If you or someone you know is experiencing a mental health crisis, call or text 988 immediately. According to the CDC and NIMH, nearly 46,000 lives were lost to suicide in 2020 alone. Comments or thoughts about suicide, also known as suicidal ideation, can begin small, for example, "I wish I wasn't here" or "Nothing matters." But over time, they can become more explicit and dangerous. She provided the following warning signs: Increased alcohol and drug use, Aggressive behavior, Withdrawal from friends, family and community, dramatic mood swings, impulsive or reckless behavior, collecting and saving pills or buying a weapon, giving away possessions, tying up loose ends, like organizing personal papers or paying off debts, saying goodbye to friends and family. Research has found that 46% of people who die by suicide had a known mental health condition. Several other factors may put a person at risk of suicide, including but not limited to: a family history of suicide, substance use: drugs can create mental highs and lows that worsen suicidal thoughts. Intoxication: Analysis from the CDC indicates around 1 in 5 people who die by suicide had alcohol in their system at the time of death. Access to firearms, a serious or chronic medical illness, gender: Although more women than men attempt suicide, men are 4x more likely to die by suicide. A history of trauma or abuse, prolonged stress a recent tragedy or loss. Suicidal behaviors are a psychiatric emergency. If you or a loved one starts to take any of these steps, seek immediate help from a health care provider or call 988 to reach the Suicide & Crisis Lifeline. If you are unsure, a licensed mental health professional can help assess. The Community Food Pantry is open on the second and fourth Thursday from 9 am to 10:45 am and again at 6 pm to 7 pm. Saturday following Thursday from 9:30 am to 10 am. The Highland Park Gives a Hoot Food Pantry is every Tuesday and Wednesday at the Zone 6 Center from 10 am to 11 am.

Council President Hersh reported happy back to school week, he reminded everyone to please be safe out there when driving it's about to get crowded. Tonight we're doing a second reading item 11a and hopefully the final passage that outlines the capital ordinance for road improvements on Graham from Fourth to Fifth Avenues then South 8th from Benner to Woodbridge and then all of Highland Avenue. Felton Avenue Tot Lot restoration is well on its way the new equipment and surfacing has been put in and the grass is now growing which is very exciting but not quite ready for public use. Nxt up there will be seating, tables and chairs and this is just part of the kind of larger network of passive recreational areas in our neighborhoods that the Mayor identified as a priority so we're really excited about this. Wednesday September 4th at 8:00 pm on Zoom please join the Environmental Commission for the regular monthly Meeting. We will talk about open space, leaf blower action and more. Neonicotinoids are a class of insecticides that are chemically similar to nicotine that are used to control harmful insects they're also among the most widely used in crop production protection and for veterinary purposes however they are also toxic to pollinators. We also will explore potential legislation at the state level that looks to address some of these harmful substances that might find their way into commercial products, curbe the use of harmful chemicals so that's the kind of thing that you can get from attending Sustainable Highland Park meetings or Environmental Commission meetings. He thanked camp counselor Amon Springer for a terrific stream exploration for the camp for civic engagement and environmentalist week. This summer Mason will be joining us for the Environmental Commission meeting because when he led that exploration he's also an environmental history major. The campers named these as yet named unnamed streams so we are looking forward to kind of hearing that report. Join Sustainable Highland Park and the Highland Park Ecology and Environmental Group for our trash cleanups, gloves, bags and other supplies are provided. Cleanups are from 10:00 a.m. to noon unless otherwise listed and the location will be announced as the date approaches. He reminded everyone shrubs are still growing and we're still mowing our lawns so please trim your corner shrubs, one of the most common concerns we get is sight line interference particularly on corner properties where the shrubs have overgrown. Garbage collection schedule for the week of September 2nd because our offices were closed on Monday in observance of Labor Day, there was no recycling or garbage collection on Monday, today Tuesday there was collection in the business district, north side and triangle, recycling collection is tomorrow business district, north side and triangle garbage collection, not on Thursday Southside recycling as usual and on Friday will be garbage collection in the business district and the Southside. This week just to follow up from the Arts on the Park, the town wide garage sale and there will be a bulk pickup Tuesday September 17th and Thursday, September 19th these are bulk pickups that you do not have to schedule. For the rest of the year you do have to make an appointment this is leave your items out and it will be collected. Recycling will not be collected during the week of September 16th through September 20<sup>th</sup>. He congratulated Officer Cleaver and Sergeant Palumbo for their service.

**Second Public Participation.**

Mayor Foster opened the floor for public participation.

Elizabeth (Buffy) Greenberg indicated that it was her understanding that the crossing guards have been informed by members of the Police Department that they are seriously considering privatizing crossing guards and that this has not been brought to the Council and asked if the Police Chief could answer questions about this directly in a public forum on what exactly has been communicated to the Crossing Guards. She indicated that she was totally opposed to privatizing the Crossing Guards, privatization is bad for our crossing guards and it's really bad for the kids and families who walk to and from school every day

Michele Racioppi said she heard reference four times so far from people on this council meeting about references to pedestrian safety and so just like my friend Buffy said I am very concerned about pedestrian safety which crossing guards are a big part of that and I did not think we're going to get better services if we give them less money less benefits and if the current crossing guards now feel like their jobs are in jeopardy, no clarification was given to the crossing guards and in fact they still are under the impression that this is that the police department would like to have happen. She suggested reassuring your crossing guards that you prioritize them and you value them and that you don't want them to lose the meager benefits that they currently. This has been very distressing for them so I would hope we can get clarification on this in this meeting that would be really helpful.

Sal Baptist said the school crossing guards have been reappointed every year before the school year begins for the past few years however you know this meeting tonight did not include the appointment of any crossing guards despite as was just mentioned many references to pedestrian safety. School starts in two days how can the children be going to school on Thursday walking through these intersections that are dangerous and some of them are even deadly without the guidance of the experienced and trustworthy crossing guards

Administrator Jover said they did have a meeting with a few of the guards today with their union representative and we explained where we were which was very early on and we've been contemplating such a move as the issue about the appointments was raised in the meeting and it was simply an oversight and we will get that resolved at the next council meeting. There was already a kickoff meeting about the beginning of the school year a few weeks back we are counting on everybody to come out on Thursday to their post so I think we cleared some of the air out in terms of where this all fits. We did reassured them that this really is just exploratory at this point and we want to explore what the options are and we haven't even made a recommendation from a staff level to public safety so we're nowhere near that stage just to reaffirm basically there was a discussion.

Chief of Police Abrams said that the problem they are having is the same problem that every small town in the State is we can't find enough crossing guards to fill all positions. We have 14 crossing guard positions we have 10 guards and we have three that are in training if they make training will be better but still for the next 20 hours they do their training. Some towns have solved this problem by privatization, we are still learning so there's no plans right now to do anything. Our crossing guards keep training and keep hiring until we fill our spots. We're trying to see if this is a solution that's going to work for Highland Park and get all of our crossing position filled for the whole year so the kids can cross safely.

There being no further business, on motion made by Councilwoman Kim-Chohan, seconded by Councilman Hale, and carried by affirmative voice vote of all Councilpersons present, the meeting adjourned at 7:57 PM.
