Our Police Officers and First Responders serve their communities with pride and devotion every day, upholding the laws and protecting citizens from harm.

This was especially relevant on April 30, 2015, when Highland Park Police Officer Kevin Shiffner was flagged down by a motorist on Raritan Avenue near First Avenue. The motorist reported that his wife was unresponsive in his vehicle, which was parked across the street. When Officer Shiffner found the victim without a pulse and not breathing, he removed her from the vehicle, radioed dispatch for EMT and began to administer CPR. Officer Sean Bibby arrived to assist Officer Shiffner in performing CPR until the HPFAS and medics arrived on the scene to continue medical care and transport the victim to RWJUH.

Because of these Officers' quick response and proper training, they were able to save the woman's life. On June 9, Officer Shiffner and Officer Bibby were awarded the Life Saving Award, awarded for an act performed in the line of duty which, through disregard of personal safety or prompt and alert reaction, results in saving a life. Congratulations to the Officers, and thank you for your dedicated service to our community.

Back for its 19th year, the weekly Highland Park Farmers Market opened on Friday June 5, once again providing locals with the Garden State's bounty for the next six months.

The market is a certified Jersey Fresh farmers market, meaning that most of the vendors at the market are New Jersey-based farms and businesses. It operates every Friday from June through December 18(except November 27) from 11:00 am – 5:30 pm, and is located in the heart of downtown Highland Park, on Raritan Avenue between 2nd and 3rd Avenues.

Stands include fruits and vegetables from local farms, cheese, bread, olive oil, meats, mushrooms, nuts, pickles, pies and and more. There are also toys, knives and housewares for sale. Many market days also feature local musicians, and on Friday, July 31 we will host a Tomato Festival with cooking demonstrations and tomato-themed activities.

Last week's Wednesday Walks with the Mayor featured a special discussion about the various plants and trees in the Native Plant Reserve in Johnson Park. Resident Mary Denver spoke about how invasive plants can change ecosystems, and the steps we are taking to protect those native ecosystems. For example, a Japanese Knotweed is being replaced with native plants such as Virginia sweetspire, silky dogwood among others, an Emerald Ash Borer lure has been placed in the Green Ash tree in front of the Environmental Center to protect the trees from the Asian Beetle, and compost piles have been installed in the NPR to cut down on vegetative waste.

Volunteers are needed to help find and apply solutions to restore healthy habitats for New Jersey wildlife.
