A Regular Meeting of the Highland Park Mayor and Council was held in Borough Hall, 221 South 5th Avenue, on Tuesday, February 5, 2019 and was called to order by Mayor Brill Mittler at 7:02 PM. Mayor Brill Mittler read the Open Public Meetings Statement.

Present: Mayor Brill Mittler, Councilpersons Fine, George, Hale, Kim-Chohan, Welkovits; Borough Attorney Schrager; Borough Administrator Jover; Borough Clerk Hullings.

Absent: Councilperson Foster Dublin; Borough Attorney Schmierer.

Councilman Hale joined Mayor Brill Mittler to present proclamation to Eagle Scout Eric Yang.

Mayor Brill Mittler asked the Council members to present their reports.

Councilwoman Kim-Chohan reported that she is proud to announce the Highland Park Arts Commission has been awarded a grant in the amount of \$4,500.00 from Middlesex County Office of Arts & History. The grant will fund a project called Access Granted. It's a two-part photo essay/creative response project where the commission will pair up photographers and individuals with disabilities in the community to respond to accessibility. The photographers will be taking pictures of the individuals as they navigate their day-to-day. The participants will have an opportunity to write/tell their story in a creative way. The project will close with a gallery exhibition. This is all in effort to provide a space for people with and without disabilities to learn together and foster stronger relationships. Allison Baldwin wrote the grant and will be spearheading the project all year. The Arts Commission kicked off their windows of understanding last month on Martin Luther King Jr. Day. The art work will be on display until the end of Black History Month, February 28th. Visit https://www.windowsofunderstanding.org/ for all the details. The next tables of understanding will take place at Sushiana February 24th 3p.m. to 5p.m. I know the Mayor will mention a little more about this. If you haven't noticed yet, our new signage is up at the Community Center, formally known as the Highland Park Senior/Youth Recreation Center. The next monthly senior luncheon will be on February 26th at 11:00 a.m., followed by a discussion with the Mayor. On January 16th, I completed a police ride along. It gave me a great overview of what is involved in patrol. It is amazing the number and types of situations the police department gets involved in. They truly have to be ready for anything. Last month, I also attended the intro to sewing class at the Highland Park Public Library. I promised, I would mention the awesome experience and show off my finished project. So, thank you to the staff at the library for providing this free event. Speaking of the Library, the Highland Park Historical Commission's next meeting is scheduled for the February 17th at 1:15 p.m. at the Library. This past weekend, I attended the FCD Chinese School Chinese New Year celebration, which is always a joy. Many Highland Park students attend this Saturday school year round. Happy Lunar New Year to our community that celebrates! Wishing you much fortune in the year of the pig.

Councilman Hale reported that he wanted to remind everyone that tomorrow night they will be holding an open public forum regarding the hiring of our new Police Chief. The event will take place at the Community Center at 7:30 p.m. At the forum, we will hear from the Borough's Labor Attorney who will explain how the process of hiring a new Chief and new Captain works in New Jersey and is working in Highland Park. We will hear an update on the process to this point. A bid part of the process is an oral interview of the candidates. The primary goal of the meeting tomorrow night is for the community to help develop questions that will be asked during this interview. We have designed the forum in a new and innovative way. Instead of having one large group discussion, we plan on dividing up into smaller focus groups so that we can hone in on specific topics and develop specific questions for the candidates. For example, we will have a small focus group to develop questions on the candidate's philosophy and ideas about handling internal disciplinary issues, external communication requirements, police training and staffing needs for effective and equitable policing and how the candidates propose to use benchmarks to measure progress and success. Each of the focus groups will be led by a member of the Highland Park Equity Commission. All of the questions and ideas developed by the focus groups will then be briefly presented in a read out session to the entire group. I am really excited about this meeting and hope that everyone will attend. Finally, I wanted to add my congratulations to Eric Yang, Highland Park's newest Eagle Scout. I am the cub master for Highland Park and my son Zach took over as Patrol Leader from Eric. I know how hard it is to become an Eagle Scout and how much of an accomplishment it is. I also know how much time it takes for the family of the Eagle Scout. I just wanted to offer my congratulations to Eric and his entire family on the great accomplishment. You make Highland Park proud.

Councilwoman Welkovits reported that the Zoning Board of Adjustment held their reorganization meeting on January 28th. To no one's surprise, all officers and professionals were reappointed. Special congratulations to our Volunteers Judy Richman, Chairperson, Rob Roesener, Vice Chairperson and Dana Korbman, Secretary. Earlier today, I was joined by Trish Sanchez and Sean Meehan, Chairperson and Vice Chairperson of the Safe Walking and Cycling Committee; Rebecca Hersh and Javier Zavaletta of Main Street Highland Park, as they attended a graduate class at the Bloustein School of Planning and Public Policy. She thanked representatives from the Project for Public Spaces for working on a Placemaking Project which will be presented on March 26th. The purpose of the studio project is to teach economic development strategies that focus on creating great places for people to live and work. We'll be doing some outreach. This studio will explore how actively engaging community stakeholders in the placemaking process can transform business as usual and lead to economic vitality and inclusive healthy places. Middlesex County has been active with the creation of a new website, ads, etc. The Mayor, Borough Administrator and I will be meeting with Middlesex County to discuss how Highland Park can be featured in their new marketing piece. Happy New Year and wishing much happiness and prosperity to all.

Councilman George wished everyone greetings for Chinese New Year and reminded everyone about Black History Month. The meeting with Fish and Wildlife for controlling deer yielded great suggestions. The best way to handle it is modern technology, a drone survey. They are moving forward on that project. On the consent agenda tonight are a number of important items such as purchasing toters for the new garbage truck. They are going out for a grant for NJDEP for electric charging stations. They pay 100% if installed on municipal property. The Meadows Trail and Native Plant Reserve are putting together a program for a strategic plan and for 1, 3 and 5 year plans. They are trying to get comments from the public. Starting to salvage large stack of old wooden benches and place them around. The Shade Tree Advisory Committee is working daily on the emerald ash borer program, which appears to be ahead of schedule.

Borough Administrator Jover reported that the drone survey will provide an accurate head count on the number of deer in town. It will provide a baseline for appropriate action. Last Thursday, there was a meeting held about the private school on Cleveland Avenue. This is the first of many discussions. She was pleased with the turnout and discussion and more information about next steps will follow.

Borough Attorney Schrager - No report.

Mayor Brill Mittler asked for a moment of silence for Babs Siperstein, trailblazer for LGBTQ rights, namesake of NJ New Babs Siperstein Law, active member of Pride Center New Jersey of Highland Park. Highland Park's First Responder heroes on February 1st at 3:00 a.m. started receiving 911 phone calls about smoke in an apartment building at 100 Montgomery Street. The Highland Park Fire Department was dispatched, along with officers from the Police Department. Firefighter Norman Shamy arrived at 100 Montgomery Street, along with Officers Alain Giles and Joseph Olarra. The officer's observed a smoke condition in the lobby of the building and began evacuating residents while Firefighter Shamy noticed flames coming out a window on the north side of the building. Officers Giles and Olarra were able to gain entry to a first floor apartment. Inside, they discovered an unresponsive male, lying on the floor. The Officers were able to pull the victim to safety, while Firefighter Shamy was fighting the fire from the outside kitchen window. The victim was triaged outside the apartment and taken to Robert Wood Johnson Hospital. He was then transferred to the St. Barnabas Hospital's Burn Center in northern New Jersey for further treatment, where he remains in critical, but stable condition. Both officers were taken to St. Peter's Hospital for treatment of smoke inhalation and were released later that morning. Numerous surrounding agencies responded to help with this fire, including fire companies from New Brunswick, Piscataway and East Brunswick, the Middlesex County Fire Marshall's Office, the Highland Park First Aid Squad, Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital, and the Milltown First Aid Squad. Highland Park OEM Coordinator H. James Polos was also on scene organizing and managing all the incoming resources from around the area. All but three apartments were cleaned and residents have returned to their original homes. The three families displaced have been resettled into three different apartments in the same complex. Lastly, she noted that the Plastic Bag Ordinance will be adopted this evening after a public hearing. Also, she noted that the next Tables of Understanding discussion will take place on February 24th from 3:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. at Sushiana.

Mayor Brill Mittler opened the meeting for public discussion and called upon all those wishing to speak to identify themselves.

Linda Wang, 302 Leia Lane, commented that she is 16 years and she wished everyone a Happy Lunar New Year. She described how her house was burglarized on January 25, 2019 when she was home alone. She called 911and ran to the master bedroom and locked the door and then locked herself in the walk-in closet. The Police Department remained on the phone with her while they dispatched Officers to come to her aid. Officers Garrity and DeCosta responded to the call and broke the doors to her home and the bedroom to get to her. She thanked them for coming to her aid. Detectives Lancry and McGraw gave her great advice about home security. She urged everyone to be more vigilant and increase security. She thanked the Highland Park Police Department for their quick response. Mayor Brill Mittler thanked her for sharing her story. Great thinking on her feet and she did the right thing.

Herb Gross, Adelaide Gardens, informed everyone that fighting in Iraq and Afghanistan will be increasing. He asked everyone to say a special prayer each day for the fighting men and women fighting for our freedom. Freedom is not free; you have to fight for it.

No one appearing to be heard, the Mayor closed the public discussion.
